What is ChatGPT?

ChatGPT is OpenAl's artificial-intelligence (AI)

 An advanced program designed to respond to language.


First released in Nov 2022.

Designed to have conversations with you.

What does it do?

It produces human-like responses to a prompt.

These can be text-based like a poem or a story or images.



How does it do that?

It has been trained on a range of data (books, websites, articles) and has analysed how those sources use language.

It predicts (like autocorrect) and mimics human language.



Are our students using it?



Are our students <u>allowed</u> to use it?

Yes- and no!

You must be at least 13 years old to use the Services. If you are under 18 you must have your parent or legal guardian's permission to use the Services.



Googling vs ChatGPT

What's also coming...



ls Al reliable?

- Al is useful when you have the information literacy skills to discern the <u>reliability</u> and <u>usefulness</u> of its response.
- But you need to know stuff about your topic too.....
- A good 'source' is a reliable source...

The point is...

- Artificial intelligence *can* make mistakes.
- You must have <u>subject</u> <u>knowledge</u> that can help you to spot those mistakes.
- Don't put incorrect information into assessments



What Chat GPT says about its limitations...

- Limitations of Chat GPT in NCEA assessment:
 - Lack of contextual understanding may not fully grasp the context and nuances of specific subjects or questions.

• Inability to assess higher-order thinking skills - may struggle to evaluate critical thinking, creativity, and complex problem-solving abilities.

What Chat GPT says about its limitations...

- Limitations of Chat GPT in NCEA assessment:
 - <u>Potential for biased responses</u> may inadvertently perpetuate biases present in the training data.

 Limited adaptability - may not effectively adapt to individual learning needs or provide personalized feedback.

Our bottom line is...

• You cannot produce work <u>for assessment</u> for NCEA that is not your own.

NCEA ASSESSMENT AUTHENTICITY STATEMENT

Instructions:

This NCEA Authenticity Statement must be confirmed and signed by all students early in each school year.

The following requirements support the principles and practices of academic integrity to NCEA assessment. Each student is required to indicate their understanding of these and to confirm that they will follow them when submitting to their teachers any work that is for assessment.

Please read:

- I will have academic integrity throughout the assessment process.
- I understand that all the work I submit for assessment must be my own.

• I have read and understand the school's assessment requirements and the consequences of submitting material for assessment that is not my own ('misconduct in assessment').

I understand that I must not receive substantial assistance or the unauthorised help of others in the preparation and presentation for assessment of my assessment work.


 I understand that I must acknowledge in an appropriate manner all information and sources of assistance used in my assessment work. This includes citing all work that is produced from Artificial Intelligence text and art generation software such as ChatGPT and DALLE 2 tools.

• Twill not allow other students to access or copy any of my assessment work nor to submit it to the teacher for assessment under their name.

Any breach of these requirements will result in the consequences of misconduct in assessment.

Authenticity

- The work you produce for assessment must be <u>authentically yours</u>
- It must be <u>your</u> response, <u>your</u> thinking, <u>your</u> understanding, <u>your</u> means of expression, <u>your</u> structuring
- You may <u>support your thinking</u> with references, quotes etc but you must <u>openly acknowledge</u> those

You have accepted the importance of Academic Integrity

 It's about honesty, trust, and respect for other people's work in an academic context

 Examples of breaching academic integrity include plagiarism, cheating, and falsification of data

You have accepted that <u>plagiarism</u> is not ok – don't....

- Represent someone else's work or ideas as your own.
- Forget that it's a kind of theft
- Copy ideas off the internet or a friend (even if you then put it into your own words), <u>without proper</u> <u>referencing</u>;
- Take passages from multiple sources, piecing them together,
- Use AI like ChatGPT, Character.ai, or Snapchat's My AI to generate your work.

You have <u>signed up</u> so.....

- Understand that...
 - There's no opt-out clause...
 - There's no apology accepted...

 A grade of 'Not Achieved' is and will be given for a breach of academic integrity/honesty

The College's response

 You are not presumed to be guilty of using it

Teachers have been asked to check for the use of AI in assessment

 It's about assuring academic integrity in your assessment

How teachers will check - examples...

- Teachers' subject knowledge
- Use of learning checkpoints
- Al Checkers
- Verbal checks

Students should not use AI for assessed "independent" coursework.



Can you give me a practice question?

Can you write this essay for me?

Can you read a paragraph and identify my errors?

Can you edit my work?

Can you give me questions to test my understanding of the content?

Can you give me the answer ?

Can you give some study advice ?

Take-away one – BIG!!!:
