This morning's assembly gives us a final opportunity to recognise more outstanding achievements before our Leavers' Assembly on Monday and of course our whole school Prizegiving at the end of November. Welcome to whānau who have joined us this morning as we have much to celebrate.

Our recent term break was a chance for a number of teams to participate in national level tournaments with the netball, girls'

basketball, and trap shooting teams doing exceptionally well. All these sports required a sustained level of commitment, training and resilience both in the lead up to and during the competitions.

The teams will be recognised later in the assembly, but a particular shout out goes to the Girls' Senior A basketball team for their second place in New Zealand – a phenomenal success, losing in the final to Westlake Girls' High School after an unbeaten run to this point.

Also competing at nationals were the Girls' A netball team, coming an impressive 13th in the country against an incredibly strong line up of teams. The trap shooting team also competed at nationals, enjoying exceptional success in the North Island Championships with the female team coming second place. Maggie Hood (Year 13) retained her title as female North Island Skeet Champion.

Congratulations to these three teams for their recent success and also to coaches and managers for their skill, encouragement, guidance and organisation.

We have also recently heard that Sienna Stowers-Smith (Year 13), along with her other achievements, has been named in the New Zealand U21 Netball team. It is very rare for a Secondary School student to be named in a team at this level and an indication of the exceptional talent of Sienna. Congratulations Sienna.

An individual performance on the world stage is the first place of Year 10 student Jake Wilson in the Amateur Jet Ski competition held recently in Arizona, USA. This was an open competition with no age restrictions which makes his first place quite exceptional. Jake will receive his recognition with a Colours Award later in the assembly.

There have also been some recent outstanding Cultural achievements. The St Andrew's College band, The E.C.H.O. played once again in the finals of the Battle of the Bands in Auckland – an impressive feat to make it to the last round against adult bands.

Georgia Eagle (Year 13) has recently returned from another trip to Scotland to compete in the World Solo Drumming Championships. Competing in Juvenile Section 5 (16-18 year-olds) against 18 other drummers, Georgia came in fifth place in this world competition.
